Pastor's Message

"Fling wide the door, unbar the gate." This is one of my favorite Advent hymns about God coming into this world. "He is the rock of our belief. The heart of mercy's gentle self. His kingly crown is holiness. His scepter is his loveliness. He brings our sorrows to an end. Now gladly praise our king and friend."

For me the song captures the essence of this season filled with hope and anticipation.

What else could we do when expecting none other than God to enter the world and transform our lives but fling and throw open doors to buildings and our human hearts?

After all we welcome God, the "Lord of lords and King of kings," who became flesh and blood and met us in Jesus. So, maybe even more than us welcoming God, it is God who welcomes each one of us. It is God who tears down gates and opens doors so nothing can keep us and God apart.

The other day I read about an art project initiated in 2014 by the Lutheran Church in Wuertemberg, Germany. It made the Guinness Book of World Records for the longest manger ever built. It was built originally out of 2014 2x2 boards, each of which represent one year since the birth of Jesus.

Every year another 2x2 board is added. The whole installation is over 80 meters long, inviting folks in the small town of Weikersheim to gather at the manger. There is room for everybody to pray and ponder the God who comes in humility and with grace. This is God's way of opening doors and unbarring gates.

Congregational Communication

Dear Members of Trinity Congregation,

This year has certainly flown by. We are already looking forward to the Christmas celebrations and looking into 2024. The Board and Call Committee met with Pastor Doug Reble on November 14th to discuss the call process. The board members were excused and the call committee further discussed the process and were presented with names of potential candidates. These names were vetted by the Call Committee and letters from Pastor Reble were created inviting the candidates to submit their Availability for Call form to the Synod office by December 31st. The Call Committee will then review the forms and make arrangements for interviews in the new year. We will update you on the process as things happen.

Christmas Eve and Advent 4 are on the same Sunday this year. The board has decided to have 1 (one) service on Sunday, December 24th at 5:00 pm in person and via Zoom, which will incorporate both Advent 4 and Christmas Eve. Additionally, there will be an in person and Zoom service on Christmas Day at 10:00 a.m.

There will be a Service of Leave-Taking for the King Street building on Sunday, January 28th at 10:00 a.m. All members of Trinity are invited. This is an in-person service only, and Zoom will not be offered. The Service of Leave-Taking is performed when a building is being closed. In this case, we are doing this in anticipation of the sale of King Street in the new year. Bishop Michael Pryse will be presiding at this service. This will be one of the last times most of you will be able to be with him as Bishop as he is retiring in June 2024. There will be a luncheon following the service and details about that will be forthcoming.

The Annual General Meeting of Trinity Congregation will be on February 25, 2024, after service. In preparation for that meeting, reports from the various committees and pastors are due to Carol-Ann by January 22, 2024, so that she can prepare the Bulletin of Reports. There will also be voting for new Board members that day. If someone approaches you to be on the Board, please prayerfully consider serving in this capacity.

Finally, as the Christmas Season draws nearer, I would like to take a moment to wish you all a very Merry Christmas and Joyous New Year. During this season, we will be celebrating Hope, Peace, Love and Joy. I pray that all four of these will fill your life in every way this Christmas and beyond. Thanks be to God.

Environmentally-Friendly Gift-Wrapping Ideas for Christmas

We all have a chance to create a more just, fair and sustainable world everyday. As we think of Christmas festival giving, we should be aware that the following practices contribute to environmental damage:

- Metallic wrapping paper
- paper with glitter or foil
- shiny paper
- some gift bags
- some sticky tapes

These materials are environmental threats because they cannot be recycled or they take a very long time to decompose.

Sustainable alternative wrapping ideas we can use

- Wrap gifts in cloth. It is not necessary to buy new cloth or fabric to wrap gifts. A more environmentallysustainable way is to re-use material or fabric that you already have. Another option is to buy it from a
 - thrift store. Canadians send 81 lbs. of textiles to landfill per year per person. Re-using is the sensible thing to do.
- Instead of using tape, use string.
- Skip the plastic bows and ribbons, and opt for natural greenery such as pine branches, pine cones, or berries and leaves as they are biodegradable.
- Use old magazines, newspapers, and maps to make trendy gift wrappings.

The Advent Wreath

Every year on the Saturday before First of Advent, I walk out into the backyard and harvest a few branches of our fir tree. I put on some Christmas music, and then I am ready to make the advent wreath. As long as I can remember we always had a wreath in our house.

When I was a child, my family gathered around the dining room table on Sunday afternoons with the wreath as the centerpiece. We enjoyed a few cookies and sang Christmas carols, rehearing for



Christmas Eve. It seems families have treasured the Advent wreath tradition for the longest time. It is a tradition that started about 184 years ago.

Pastor Johann Wichern lived in 19th century Hamburg, Germany. He was a pastor who devoted himself to missionary work among the poor. When he walked the streets of Hamburg, he met many homeless children who had lost their parents or whose parents were simply too poor to provide for them. Johann Wichern decided to help and founded a children's organization called the "Rauhe Haus", meaning rough house. This became a new home for these children where they learned a trade.

Pastor Wichern was also passionate about sharing his Christian faith with the children. The hope and promise of Advent were especially important to him. Every evening he sat down with them, shared stories and led them in prayer. Inevitably the children would ask, "How much longer do we have to wait for Christmas? How many more days?"

As an answer to these questions and to bring some light into the dark winter evenings he put a big old wooden wheel to a new and meaningful use. He placed 24 candles on the wheel. There were four large ones for the Sundays and twenty small ones for the weekdays. Each day one more candle was lit, and the children were allowed to see and experience for themselves the light of God shine brighter every day. It reminded them of the comforting message of Isaiah, "The people who have walked in darkness will see a great a light."

The children of the "Rauhe Haus" soon started to decorate the wheel with branches of coniferous trees. Others who saw this first advent wreath loved it and started to make their own. They began to reduce the number to the four red candles that were lit on Sundays.

Soon this tradition spread all over Germany, then Europe and soon immigrants brought it to North America. The advent wreath is not only a help for children to count the days until Christmas, but it is also a meaningful tradition.

The wreath itself, which is made of various evergreens, signifies continuous life. The circle of the wreath, which has no beginning or end, symbolizes the eternity of God and the everlasting life we find in Christ. The pine, holly, and yew signify immortality. The cedar signifies strength and healing. The pinecones symbolize life and resurrection.

The four candles of the Advent wreath specifically symbolize the Christian concepts of hope, peace, joy and love, with these candles being lit subsequently throughout each week of the Advent season. Many Advent wreaths also have a white candle in the centre to symbolize the arrival of Christmastide, which is known as the 'Christ candle'. In Germany the candles were traditionally red, now they come in various colours. In North America advent wreaths often have three purple or blue candles and one is white.

May the advent wreaths we see over the next weeks remind us of the light and hope that Jesus brought into our world. "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness— on them light has shined." (Isaiah 9:2).
