From Preparing to Rejoicing

"All went to their own towns to be registered. Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child." (Luke 2:3-5, NRSV)

December can feel like a month filled with mixed expectations as our social calendar and church calendar work toward the same date but with different purposes. Socially we are celebrating throughout the early part of the month, enjoying days off work and celebrating the holiday season. In church we remain in a period of preparation for most of December until our time of rejoicing comes on Christmas Eve and then continues into January, long after most trees and decorations around town have been removed.

Four words that have been suggested for reflection over the Advent season are "Watch, Prepare, Witness, Rejoice." Each week of Advent we may reflect on these words and how the biblical story prepares us for Christ's birth, which is welcomed on December 25th.

We **watch** to see what is happening around us. We observe in what ways people are in need of hope. We see those ways in which God is forming us. Joseph watches for instructions from outside his control as he is led to the city of his family line.

Just a quick update on the progress of the Redevelopment of Trinity. The board and various advisory committees have met during the months of October and November. This is to help move along the Site Plan that the architects need to send to the city to get all the approvals. They intend to submit the Site Plan sometime in December. On November 24th, we showed a small video of what the Sanctuary could look like and an overview of the new addition as well. We are proposing removing most of the pews and replace them with chairs as the video shows. We had samples of the chairs so people could sit on them and provide some feedback. This will allow us to make the Sanctuary into a truly flexible space that could be rented out to the community to provide extra income for Trinity. Thank you to Jim Ridge for creating the video. The video will be available on our website on December 1.

As we move into the time of Advent, Christmas, and a new calendar year, I want to thank our board, pastors, advisory committee members and the congregation for their support during this busy year. If a verse was missed, the player would have to forfeit a sweet or a trinket. Here is the list of theological parallels that have been made for each verse.

The Partridge in a Pear Tree is Jesus Christ

2 Turtle Doves are the Old and New Testaments

3 French Hens are Faith, Hope and Charity

4 Calling birds are the Four Gospels (in the original called *colly* (song) birds)

5 Golden Rings are the first Five Books of the Old Testament

6 Geese-a-laying are the six days of creation

7 Swans-a-swimming are the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit

8 Maids-a-milking are the eight Beatitudes

9 Ladies dancing are the nine Fruits of the Holy Spirit

10 Lords-a-leaping are the ten commandments

11 Pipers piping are the eleven faithful apostles

12 Drummers drumming are the twelve points of doctrine in the Apostle's Creed

Many of us have enjoyed this beloved song over the years and not unlike those 18th century children, we may have also struggled to remember all of those twelve verses in the right order. Perhaps the idea that the lyrics have connections to Christian theology will add a touch of renewed interest in this delightful song.

Creation Care Group- Real vs. Artificial Christmas Trees By Deborah Lindeman

Christmas trees are a centrepiece of many homes during the festive season, for good reasons too, as they are beautiful and are steeped in tradition and symbolism. Due to convenience, many people chose to use an artificial tree. In fact, in the U.S., about ten million artificial trees are purchased each year! There is no getting around the fact that the manufacturing and transportation of all these trees has a large carbon footprint. Most are imported thousands of miles from China and are made of products that are harmful to the environment, such as petroleum plastics and heavy metals. When it is time to discard them, they end up in landfill where they will never biodegrade.

On the other hand, most real trees come from regional tree farms that support the local economy. During the seven years the trees are growing on these lands, they are absorbing CO2 and releasing oxygen, stabilizing soil, and providing habitat for wildlife. Of the trees that are harvested each year, ten times that number are left standing, and seedlings replace the ones removed. Used trees that are collected by your city are converted into mulch instead of being thrown into landfills. Many environmental organizations incorporate used Christmas trees in their restoration projects, such as carp barriers, bank fortification, and habitat creation. The Royal Botanical Gardens collects them annually for many of their projects on their natural lands. You would have to use your artificial tree for ten to twenty years to offset the carbon footprint of a real tree!

So, what is the eco-minded person to do? Most definitely, purchasing real trees is best for the environment. However, if you already have an artificial tree, your best choice is to continue enjoying it for years to come. A real tree is not a viable option for all people, so if you do choose to purchase an artificial tree, consider checking out buy and sell markets for a used one.
